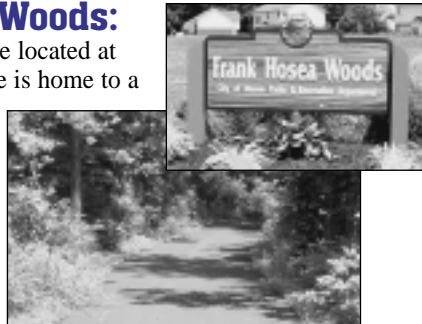


# Take a Tour of Mason Parks

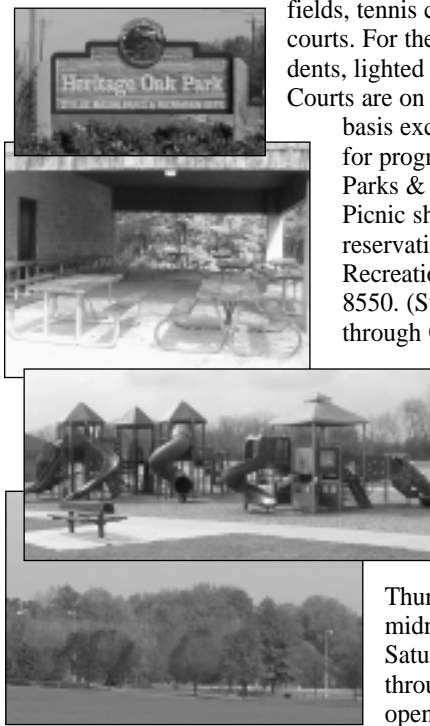
**1 Corwin M. Nixon Park:** Located at 6249 Mason-Montgomery Road, just north of Tylersville Road, this 51-acre park provides the community with athletic fields, restrooms, a concession stand, picnic areas, a playground, and a picnic shelter. Lighted ball diamonds allow extended evening league play. The park also includes the Lou Eves Municipal Pool and is the site of the annual Halloween Festival. Corwin M. Nixon Park is open May through August from 7:00 a.m. to sunset, and September through April from 8:00 a.m. to sunset.



**2 Frank Hosea Woods:** The 14-acre nature preserve located at 4862 Hickory Woods Drive is home to a wide variety of Ohio flora and fauna. A bike path meanders for almost a quarter mile through pine, hickory, and walnut trees. Frank Hosea Woods is open during daylight hours.



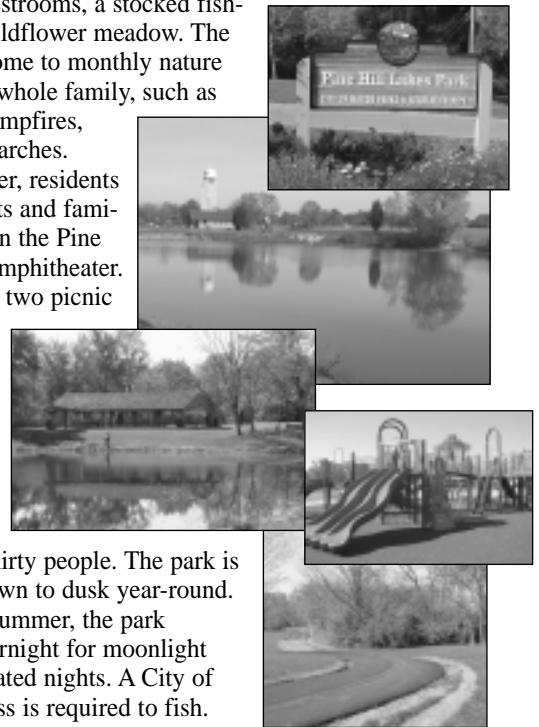
**3 Heritage Oak Park:** This 80-acre park is located at 4601 U.S. Route 42 North. In addition to being a popular “active” park, Heritage Oak Park is graced by several memorial trees donated in honor of loved ones. Follow the tree-lined drive past athletic fields, tennis courts, and basketball courts. For the convenience of our residents, lighted courts extend playing time. Courts are on a first-come, first-serve basis except during times reserved for programs sponsored by the Parks & Recreation Department. Picnic shelters are available for reservation through the Parks & Recreation Department at 513-229-8550. (Summer reservations, April through October, are available to residents only.) Shelter 1 has seating for up to 80 people and shelter 2 can seat up to 50 people. The park is open March through October from sunrise to 11:00 p.m., Sundays through Thursdays, and from sunrise to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays. From November through February, the park is open during daylight hours.



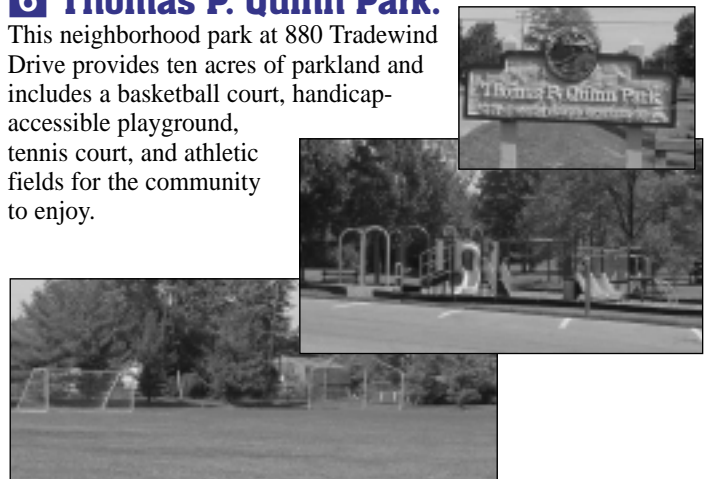
**4 Meadows Park:** This quiet neighborhood park with four acres provides a playground, athletic field, basketball court, and picnic area. It is located at 643 Lindemann Lane and is within walking distance of homes in the Meadows area and the Birchwood Farms subdivision. The park is open during daylight hours.



**5 Pine Hill Lakes Park:** Located at 211 Kings Mill Road, this beautiful nature park offers two miles of wooded hiking trails, meandering creeks, wildlife habitats, a playground, a water “sprayground,” restrooms, a stocked fishing lake, and a wildflower meadow. The 83-acre park is home to monthly nature programs for the whole family, such as Creek Crawls, Campfires, and Shamrock Searches. During the summer, residents enjoy free concerts and family entertainment in the Pine Hill Lakes Park amphitheater. The park also has two picnic shelters. A large shelter by the lake is on a first-come, first-serve basis. A smaller shelter nestled by the trees can be reserved for groups of up to thirty people. The park is normally open dawn to dusk year-round. However, in the summer, the park remains open overnight for moonlight fishing on designated nights. A City of Mason fishing pass is required to fish.



**6 Thomas P. Quinn Park:** This neighborhood park at 880 Tradewind Drive provides ten acres of parkland and includes a basketball court, handicap-accessible playground, tennis court, and athletic fields for the community to enjoy.
